# Church at Home The Second Sunday of Advent



#### **Before the Service**

#### A very warm welcome to Church at Home this Second Sunday of Advent.

We are delighted that our President is the Rt Revd Olivia Graham, Bishop of Reading, and our address is given by Bishop Fredrik Modéus, Bishop of Växjö – Oxford's link diocese in Sweden. Further elements of our worship are the fruit of collaborations with our sisters and brothers in Växjö, as well as diverse churches and colleges across our Diocese. Many thanks to all who have contributed to lead us in worship.

Advent is a time when Christians are called to 'keep watch' – to be expectant and prepare for God's coming among us in Christ. Such watchfulness is about noticing God at work, and also noticing the ways our world falls short of God's intention. We anticipate God's coming by attending to injustice and brokenness; by confessing and lamenting; by committing ourselves to sharing the healing and wholeness revealed in Jesus.

One vast and appalling injustice which many have become newly-conscious of this year is **gender-based violence**. As the world retreated inside homes during lockdown, reports showed an alarming increase in violence against women and girls in their own homes, including in the UK. Families had no choice but to spend time together, with the situation made worse by restricted access to the usual means and routes of escape.

Since 2012, the Anglican Consultative Committee has called on all Anglican churches to mark the United Nations' 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence (which runs from 25 November to 10 December) in liturgy, prayer and study.

Mother's Union – the 150-year-old Anglican network of women's groups – is a leading supporter and advocate for this UN campaign. MU's international work on gender-based violence has earned them a permanent seat at the United Nations on the Commission on the Status of Women. Here in the UK, including in the Diocese of Oxford, local branches of Mother's Union have been particularly involved in supporting women's refuges this year, and continue to campaign for improvements in the Law on Domestic Abuse.

Our service today takes up the call to mark the United Nations' 16 Days of Activism against Gender-based Violence, seeking to engage with this discomforting yet necessary theme within our Advent prayers and preparations. At the end of our service, a short film from Mother's Union offers more details on their campaign, and how to find out more.

As we prepare to worship the living God, let us remember in prayer all who are victims of gender-based violence; let us lament the human cultures which perpetuate the sin of unequal gender relations; and let us resolve to not stay silent but to act to end it.

So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. (Genesis 1:27)

An abuser hits a human being made in the image of God: he hits that of Christ. This is and must be seen as a sin which permeates churches across the world, too often hiding behind so-called cultural norms which, if Jesus had followed those of his day, would have made for a very short Gospel indeed.

## The Gospel Reading

Mark 1:1-8

Reader Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.
