Before the Service

Welcome to this service of Church at Home on the third Sunday of Advent. We are delighted that The Revd Serena Tajima from St Mary's Banbury will be presiding for us, and that our preacher is The Revd David Tyler, who is Associate Archdeacon of Dorchester. It is wonderful to once again be led in our worship by churches, chaplaincies and colleges from across the Diocese of Oxford and we are hugely grateful to all of our contributors who have read, played, sung and prayed this service into being.

The third Sunday of Advent is known as 'Gaudete Sunday' after the introit that traditionally precedes the Eucharist on this day: "Gaudete in Domino semper". Gaudete means 'rejoice', and marks a lift in the more solemn nature of the rest of the Advent preparations. It is symbolised liturgically by the use of rose-pink colour (a subtle lightening of the Advent purple) on vestments and on the third candle on the Advent wreath.

It is also the week we hear of John the Baptist preparing the way for the coming of Christ, and our reading from Isaiah reflects the promise that the Messiah will bring the 'oil of gladness' and so the prophet exults us to 'rejoice in the Lord.'

It may have seemed as strange to those hearing John's words along the banks of the Jordan in the first century, as it seems to us now, to rejoice in midst of a turbulent time, marked with such grief. But we rejoice precisely because it is into a troubled and broken world, that God chose to come and comfort his people; not only with words and promises, but with his very presence walking among them.

As we travel this Advent journey, we do so together as companions on the road with Christ: who was; who is; and who is to come.

Reader A reading from the prophecy of Isaiah

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion - to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit.

They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

For I the Lord love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the Lord has blessed.

I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said.
