All Saints' Day and the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed on All Souls' Day both celebrate this mutual belonging. All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that sanctity may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living.

As we celebrate All Saints and remember the baptismal belonging of all Christians in Christ, we pray with and for the people of France, following Thursday's terrorist attack at a church in Nice, in which three people were killed. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

Thank you to all those from across the Diocese who have made this service possible, including clergy and people from Oxford, Reading, Gerrards Cross, Marlow, Cowley, Abingdon and Great Missenden.

Our All Saints' Day service begins as we join with the choir of St Edmundsbury Cathedral to sing:

1 For all the saints who from their labours rest, who thee by faith before the world confessed, thy name, O Jesus, be forever blest.

If you find it helpful you may wish to use one of the following prayers, or simply listen to the music and meditate upon God's love for you.

with your presence. Feed me with your body and unite me in your blood, that I may be your blessing to a world in need. Amen.


