Church at Home Christ the King





Dag Hammarskjold, former UN Secretary General, once said at the cusp of a new year, 'For all that has been, thanks. To all that shall be, yes.'

The festival of Christ the King stands at a crossroads, with one liturgical year behind us and the promise of a new year ahead, beginning with Advent next week, which will bring a new energy as we prepare our hearts for Christmas. It is a relatively new liturgical festival, instituted 95 years ago in 1925 by Pope Pius XI as he sought to respond to the increase in secularism and nationalism.

But today, let us look back over the year that has passed - and what a year it has been, with the spread of the Coronavirus across the world. There is much to lament about what we have experienced and lost because of the national lockdowns, but we must also practise the discipline of noticing and being grateful for the mercies and kindnesses that have been present. We hold all that has occurred this past year, and we lift it before Christ our King, whose kingdom we long for and are called to make present among us.

As such, here is an opportunity to give thanks for all who have contributed to Church at Home services since the very first, back in March. For all Church at Home services, thanks. To all that shall be, yes.

We give a special thanks to Bishop Steven, who presides for us this morning, and for the Revd Ian Biscoe from Emmanuel Church Bicester, who is preaching for us.

This service of Christ the King borrows liturgical elements from previous Church at Home services and from Diocesan school assemblies, beginning with the very first Call to Worship from March 2020. Let us be mindful of the words in that call: 'I lay at the foot of the Cross all my fears.' Those words echo as true today as they did in March, as they have done for centuries, and will echo true into the new liturgical year and beyond.

Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'
