Church at Home The Nineteenth Sunday after Trinity





Before the Service

Welcome to this service of Church at Home as we join together in worship with Bishop Alan Wilson and contributors from across the Diocese of Oxford. We are especially delighted to welcome The Revd Dr Guy Harrison, as our preacher this morning.

Today the church celebrates the feast of St Luke the Evangelist or the 'beloved physician' as Colossians 4.14 refers to him. Believed to be the author of both the Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel in his name, Luke provides a brilliantly descriptive, event-focussed narrative of the life of Jesus Christ and (in Acts) of Luke's own time accompanying St Paul.

Whilst almost forensic in its detail and nuance, Luke's Gospel keeps the 'bigger picture' of God's Kingdom as its primary concern; with an emphasis on the close relationship between salvation, human flourishing and mission. We hear in today's Gospel reading, how the seventy are sent out to be people of peace; healing the sick and proclaiming that 'the Kingdom of God has come near.'

For Luke, healing and salvation are inextricable. The Greek word 'sozo' occurs sixteen times in his Gospel and can be translated as both 'to save' and also 'to restore to health'. This holistic approach to salvation is at the heart of the church's healing ministry and offers a picture of what fullness of life in Christ looks like far beyond any narrow interpretation of healing simply as 'cure'. Whilst great miracles of recovery from illness do sometimes happen, this is not the only (or even the most usual) form of healing, and we must be careful to neither make assumptions about other people's needs nor to pathologize difference. As Michael Perham comments:

'to look for so called 'results' of healing in a clinical sense... is to attempt to confine God's work to our own immediate horizons. There are countless examples of those enabled to grow through pain and suffering... given confidence that enables the doctors to do their work so much more effectively, of those enabled to die well... [and those who] have received the courage and grace to live life to the full' (SPCK 2000, p.190)

In this global pandemic, some outward signs of healing ministry (such as the laying on of hands and anointing) have had to take other forms as we each seek to protect one another from coronavirus, but the work of prayer continues whatever the circumstance. As we worship together today, let us hold before God all those who work in caring professions, in healthcare chaplaincy, and those in communities who are inspired by St Luke to dedicate their lives to Christ's work of healing and wholeness in body, mind, spirit and relationship.

ReaderHear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.AllGlory to you, O Lord.

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you.
