I am one of the younger candidates and I have a breadth of experience in the Church of England, and beyond. If elected, I will shape a church that I can serve with dignity and integrity for what I hope will be many years of Anglican ministry.

Parish Passion (#SaveTheParish)

I love the parish system; we are naturally inclusive, providing a spiritual home for all in the country (as long as we remember that they are indeed welcome). I'm concerned about funds funnelled into middle-management models. Let's pour funds into providing poor, rural, and multi-church parishes with administrators to support the work of the priests, like the Acts 6 deacons. Read verse 7 for the outcome of a grass-roots approach. Bad administrative expectations kill the mission of Christ; let's be a church that doesn't kill our own.

Valuing Vocation

I have experience of the encouraging vocations, from work with Ministry Division when discerning my own call, to leading Personal Discipleship Plans with laity in my curacy. In my new roles as incumbent and chaplain (both University and College), I want the routes to following God's call to be open to all. Also, I am relatively fresh from a 'golden curacy', but I have heard too many stories from peers whose curacies left them feeling isolated, undervalued, and, sometimes, bullied. I want to ensure that the spark of vocation is safeguarded throughout priestly formation. Bad experiences in the discernment and training processes kill vocation; let's be a church that doesn't kill our own.

Inclusive Church (#InclusiveOxford)

I was most moved by what +Steven said at a Diocesan Synod about how Jesus takes a small child from the edge and places them in the centre. To me, this is Christ-like inclusivity: to bring those on the margins to the centre. This applies to poverty, race, disability and neurodiversity as well as gender identity and sexuality. How we treat any one of the individuals within these groups is how we treat them all. I serve as an LGBTI+ Chaplain, and I have listened to laity and clergy from different church traditions on theology, fears, and experiences of church in relationship to gender identity and sexuality. I am uniquely positioned to speak into the LLF conversations over the coming years. Bad theology kills people – literally – so let's be a church that doesn't kill our own.

I will happily answer any questions you have about my theology, approaches, and opinions to subjects both listed above or not.
